

Gardening Column August 2009

In spite of the August heat making it hard to believe, it will get cooler and it is time to begin thinking about the fall growing season.

August is the last month for applying a complete fertilizer to lawns. Diseased lawns should not be fertilized. Centipede grass does not necessarily require more fertilizer. After August, grasses need to get ready for fall and winter when they need to spend energy on root and cell wall growth rather than making green leaves. For that reason a fertilizer that is lower in nitrogen and higher in potassium is recommended for any fall application. Use water soluble 20-20-20 fertilizer for annuals and houseplants. If needed, perennials should be lightly fertilized. Roses should receive 1 Tablespoon per foot of height of 10-10-10. Sometimes by now the soil in containers has formed a hard crust. You should break it up lightly to improve penetration of water.

Deadheading, removing dead flowers, should be done to prolong blooming but it is too late for severe pruning of shrubs and perennials. Chrysanthemums need to begin forming buds for fall flowers and shouldn't be pinched back after mid July. Hydrangeas and azaleas should not be severely pruned until after next year's flowering. Removing seed heads from crape myrtles could result in a new flush of flowers. Cut iris back to a 6" height and divide if needed. Keep cutting back herbs to prevent them from going to seed. Many annuals get overgrown and worn out from the heat and humidity of summer. Impatiens, marigolds, begonias, petunias, and geraniums are some annuals that could have a second life and would respond well to being cut back by half and lightly fertilized. You can also get a fall crop of annuals such as zinnias and marigolds by starting them now from seed.

After mid August you can begin sowing fall vegetable seeds for lettuces, greens, and other cool weather vegetables. Check out Clemson University's website for a complete list of vegetables that grow well in this area in cooler weather. Keep weeding, watering, and watching for insects.

Dear Brother Knights

If you've been a Knight for many years, I know you've heard the Knights talk about the value of whole life many times, but in the current market place, it bears repeating.

The reason some of your money should be invested in whole life is for stability and for the future. If you plan to die within the next couple of years, buying only term insurance makes the most sense. Buy all you can for your family—remember you won't be around to enjoy it anyway. Don't get me wrong, term insurance is great. (And the Knights offer very attractive term insurance.) It protects our loved ones at a very affordable rate. If you live—as most of us plan to do--you bought a product whose purpose was to protect your family in the case of a premature death. It has served its purpose and by age 65 or 70 it has usually gone by the wayside. And then what? This is where whole life comes into play. It has guaranteed rates of return. It has cash value, and while it is increasing in cash value and death benefit, the rates will never increase. So after the term insurance is gone and our investments may or may not have returned at the rates we wish they had, the stable K of C life insurance policy is there to pick up the slack. It's steady growth over many years, makes all the difference. It is always growing, always moving in the right direction, regardless of the markets.

If you have a small policy, it will be enough to bury you. But if you have a large policy, or maybe two or three, you can borrow from them if you choose.
