

KNIGHT OF THE MONTH FEBRUARY, 2009 GENE KNISLEY

Gene was born in Charleston and grew up in rural St. Mary's Parish on Yonges Island, SC. Following high school, he entered the army and served in several units from 1952-55, including the 11th Airborne Div., 187 Regimental Combat Team and the 82nd Airborne Div. Following separation from the military, he attended The Citadel as a veteran student and received a BSCE degree in 1960. During his professional career, he received graduate degrees in both engineering and business.

Gene retired from active engineering practice in 1991 but continues to be involved in project design and construction with the Charleston Naval Complex Redevelopment Authority as Operations Director.

Gene is married to the former Natalie Johnson of Charleston. They have three children: Tom, a brother Knight, Tracy Hahn in Florence, SC and Tim in New Berne, NC. Gene and Natalie have seven grandchildren and expect to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary next year. Gene credits Natalie for keeping their family close.

Both Gene and Natalie are active in Christ Our King Parish and together serve as Ministers of the Eucharist. Natalie also serves those in hospitals and the homebound. Gene says they gift each other by attending daily Mass together, where he also serves as a Lector.

Shamrock is the national flower of Ireland. According to legend, St. Patrick planted it in Ireland because its three small leaves represented the Holy Trinity. All loyal sons of Eire still wear a shamrock in their lapels on St. Patrick's Day. The name shamrock, which means trefold

(three-leaved). It is given to a number of plants, but a small clover is usually considered the true shamrock. Its leaves have a bluegreen color. The shamrock appears with the thistle and the rose on the British coat of arms, because these are the national flowers of Ireland, Scotland, and England.



March 2009 Gardening Tips

In March we gear up for the spring growing season.

Because of the danger of a late frost it is best to hold off planting summer flowering annuals until the second half of the month. Pre-emergent weed control can be applied until Mar. 10. Carefully read the label as it can be harmful to grass that is coming out of dormancy. This is a good time to aerate your lawn. Start replacing last year's mulch but wait before placing under your azaleas and camellias until all the flowers have fallen. Organic mulches are preferable because they add organic material to the soil. Mulch is important for keeping soil from getting too hot, for moisture retention, for helping to control weeds, and for a good looking appearance. Some good mulches are: bark nuggets, pine straw, shredded hardwood, and slightly shredded leaves. Pine straw is best for slopes.

One bale covers 20 sq. ft. Bark nuggets have a tendency to float away during hard rains. Apply mulch at a depth of 3". Keep it at least 2" away from plant's trunk or stem.

After you see growth buds on rose bushes, fertilize with a slow release fertilizer. Shrubs starting to show new growth need fertilizing with 16-4-8 slow release fertilizer. Fertilize azaleas and camellias after they finish blooming. Begin giving houseplants the recommended amount of fertilizer. Warm season grass should <u>not</u> be fertilized until April or 2 weeks after it has begun to turn green. (e.g. Centipede, Bermuda, Zoysia, and St. Augustine)

Because they provide nutrition to the bulb, do not cut back the leaves of spring flowering bulbs.

Late in the day when bees are not present, spray roses for black spot.

Apply fire ant bait over entire yard if you have had a problem with them. For long term control use a product containing fipronil.

In the later part of the month or when weather warms up you can plant seeds for summer annuals and vegetables such as beans, cucumber, corn, squash, and most herbs. You can also put out seedlings for onions, peppers, and tomatoes.
