YEAR OF THE PRIEST

September Gardening 2009

Rev. Lawrence Bernard McInerny

From the time of his birth at St. Francis Hospital, Charleston, on January 28, 1951, Father McInerny has been a part of the Catholic community of Charleston. He was to be named for an uncle who died in infancy, but being Irish the family needed to change the name somewhat lest bad luck be repeated. Instead of getting the uncle's full name, James Bernard, "Lawrence" was taken from the relatively new pastor at Stella Maris, Fr. Lawrence McLaughlin.

Though the number of Catholics was small in the South, at least in the cities the Church provided a social, educational and healthcare network for its people. Thanks for the foresight of Father Lawrence McLaughlin, Stella Maris School was just getting started when Fr. McInerny was born. He graduated from Stella Maris in 1965 and naturally went on to The Bishop England High School. After high school, a two year stint at Newberry College provided the setting to discern a call to the Priesthood. Starting at Mount Saint Mary's College in Emmitsburg, Maryland, he would complete college then go on to theological training, earning a M.A. in Theology. It was at Mount Saint Mary's that he joined the Knights of Columbus receiving all three degrees through the college council. He was ordained a priest on December 8, 1979 by Bishop Unterkoefler.

Two years after ordination, Bishop Unterkoefler sent Father to obtain a licentiate in Canon Law as the Revised Code was finally being completed after The Second Vatican Council. Obtaining his degree in 1984, he returned to the Diocese to serve in several capacities. As a Canon Lawyer, he worked in the Diocesan Tribunal and would eventually become the Judicial Vicar of the Diocese and Canonical Consultant to the Bishop. In addition, he served twice as Director of Vocations, as Dean of the Charleston Deanery, Vicar for Retired Clergy, and on various boards and committees of the Diocese. He also served as Rector of The Bishop England High School and in various parishes. Parish assignments include: St. Mary's, Blessed Sacrament and Christ Our King in the Charleston area in addition to Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Camden and St. Mary's, Greenville. Since 1991, he has served as pastor of his home parish, Stella Maris.

Father is grateful for all who encouraged him to the Priesthood and the many parishioners and friends who continue to support him in his vocation. In particular, he expresses his fondness for the Sisters of Charity of Our Lady of Mercy who taught him from the first grade through the twelfth. His aunt, Sr. M. Augustine, was also a member of Stella Maris and entered the OLM's in1921. Likewise, there are many parishioners of Stella Maris who have supported him in his vocation from the beginning.

Asked about hobbies and needs for his hobbies, Father says he has plenty of interests but more than enough supplies. If anyone can provide more time in the day, it would be a great help. Otherwise, prayers for more vocations, encouragement of vocations and general spiritual support would be much appreciated. No more fertilizing lawns or perennials until spring. Apply a fast release fertilizer to roses (the last time this year) and annuals. When night temperatures are in 50's, apply preemergent herbicide to prevent winter weeds in lawns. Do not apply if fungus such as brown patch is present. Brown patch can be seen in a lawn early in morning as irregular brown rings with green in middle.

Clean up fallen leaves and petals under roses and other plants. They can harbor diseases and insects over winter. Keep areas weed free. Prune ever-blooming roses. Good time to plant new roses.

Order tulip bulbs now and refrigerate for 6-8 weeks. Store other spring bulbs in cool place (55 ish) and plant when soil is cool (60). Do not keep them in a vegetable drawer with fruits and vegetables because the food gives off a gas that can prevent bulbs flowering. Do not store in a plastic bag. Bigger bulbs produce bigger flowers, but if you can wait, small, less expensive bulbs will get just as big after a few seasons. Avoid soft and mushy bulbs.

Shop for perennials to plant in late Sept. or Oct. Good ones for fall color for next year are: Mexican brush sage, cigar plant, sedum 'Autumn Joy', Confederate hibiscus, ironweed, swamp sunflower, and chrysanthemums. Agastache x 'Black Adder' blooms from June to frost, is loved by bees and butterflies and is heat and drought tolerant. Colorful vegetables to plant from seed with winter annuals: Mizuna, Japanese mustard-spinach, tatsoi, and arugula. Plant lettuce, parsley, dill, sage, thyme, rosemary, cilantro. (Should you say herbs or erbs? The English sound out the h but the French don't. Americans say it either way.) Keep new plants well watered. Fall is a dry season. Spacing guide: if mature plant is under 1' plant 12"-18" apart, 1'-21/2' space 18"-24" and larger space 3'. Preserve basil by chopping leaves and mixing with a little olive oil, freeze in ice cube tray then transfer to plastic freezer bag. Chop up chives and freeze If Davlilies, amaryllis, iris, liriopi, monkey grass, and other perennials are crowded and didn't bloom well they can be divided when it begins to cool off. Space far apart so they won't need dividing again for a few years. Prepare houseplants now to move inside in October. Remove insects and move to shadier spots. To keep root bound houseplants in same pot, remove from pot, cut off bottom 1/3 of root growth, add new soil to pot and put back into same pot. Keep well watered. If you bring hibiscus inside for winter, lightly trim it and choose an indoor spot with bright light.

When weather cools, spray Camellias for scale with horticultural oil. To get to the underside of leaves, use a hand held pump sprayer.

Mark joined Council 9475 in January, 2009, and currently is a 2nd Degree Knight. He has helped with the spaghetti dinner and the membership committees.


Mark and Laura are members of Christ Our King parish. He helped with the parish picnic and volunteers at St. Vincent DePaul Society.
